Steps to Take When a Pensioner Dies

With each quarterly Branch report that is submitted and accompanied by your SAGE publication, the Algonquin Valley Branch requests that you send us a death notification of the pensioner or their spouse. When we receive such notices the Branch sends out a pamphlet entitled STEPS TO BE TAKEN WHEN A PENSIONER DIES. Here are the essential steps to prevent delay receiving allowances and death benefits:

- Contact Service Canada toll-free at 1-800-622-6232 to advise of the death, to stop CPP and OAS
 payments and to receive survivor benefits of a one-time CPP lump sum death benefit and a CPP
 survivor allowance.
- 2. Contact the following to receive survivor benefits of a survivor allowance and possibly a supplementary death benefit:
 - a. For public service pensioners Public Services and Procurement Canada 1-800-561-7930
 - b. For CAF pensioners Canadian Forces Pension Office 1-800-267-0325
 - c. For RCMP pensioners RCMP Pension Office 1-855-502-7090
- 3. Contact the pension offices if you as a survivor do not receive forms for continued coverage of the Public Service Health Care Plan (PSHCP) and if you so choose to receive coverage under the Pensioner's Dental Service Plan. Coverage is not automatic and if you do not apply for PSHCP coverage with 60 days, there is a further three-month waiting period in which no benefits are given.

Algonquin Valley Branch hosted an Advocacy Information Night on December 1, 2022 at the Best Western in Pembroke. Our guest speaker, Amy Baldry, from the National Office presented an excellent overview of our organization's advocacy initiatives. While it was hoped more members and non-members were present, the information was rich in content, specifically addressing the 4 priorities of advocacy. These priorities are: Retirement Income Security, Pharmacare, National Seniors Strategy and Veteran Well-Being. Our organization is the largest national advocacy organization representing active and retired members of the federal public service, Canadian Armed Forces, RCMP and retired federally appointed judges. It is important to also know that our organization is 1 of the 3 members who negotiate with the Treasury Board changes to our Public Service Health Care Plan. Advocacy is what we do. Membership is who we are. The stronger our membership ... the stronger our advocacy.

Branch Membership Drive

Our Association is always looking for members. One way is for you to ask a friend or neighbour if they are a current member of the National Association of Federal Retirees. If they are not, you can explain to them that we carry on a tradition of strong, smart advocacy campaigns to protect our members' earned pensions and benefits, and to build a better retirement for all Canadians.

You can let your friends or neighbours know that they can begin enjoying the benefits of membership. They will become part of one of the 79 branches across the country that has become a team of passionate volunteers who are there for them – connecting with MPs, organizing events, answering questions and so much more. As well, there are savings and perks with the preferred partner program. The program offers terrific savings and exclusive discounts to Association members in the realms of health, technology, home and auto insurance, financial advice and travel.

Your friends and neighbours can even join if they are not retired! Membership is open to anyone paying into or receiving a pension from Canada's Public Service, the RCMP or the Canadian Armed Forces, federally appointed judges and to honourably discharged non-pensioned veterans. Anyone receiving a survivor benefit from the pensions mentioned above is also eligible.

Membership costs just \$52.56 per year for an individual and \$68.28 per year for a couple (as of December 2022). That's like a couple of large takeout coffees each month! The fee amount helps support Federal Retirees' work for better pensions for all Canadians and provides full access to all benefits.





The double membership option for a couple doubles their impact and provides membership to a spouse or partner! Both become eligible for all member benefits, including the exceptional rates on MEDOC travel insurance, access to our knowledgeable research staff, four high-quality issues of Sage magazine each year and informative reports and updates from the Association's advocacy team.

Either way they get instant access. Payment can be made by credit card, or the more popular way by monthly withdrawal from their pension.

Do we have your email address and telephone number? — The Association and AVB Executive Committee do not have email addresses and/or telephone numbers for a substantial number of our members.
